For the first time in 83 years the Bishops of the United States have called for a National Eucharist Congress to

take place in 2024 in Indianapolis, IN. Their hope is to bring 80,000 Catholics together to worship Jesus present in the Blessed Sacrament and enkindle a missionary fire in the hearts of the American faithful. The last gathering of this kind for the Catholic faithful in the USA was the 1976 International Eucharistic Congress in Philadelphia, PA. So why now, after all these years, is this extraordinary form of devotion being revived?

'Revived' that is the key word. To revive is:

- to return to or restore to consciousness or life
- to become active or flourishing again.
- to restore from a depressed, inactive, or unused state
- to renew in the mind or the memory.

In 2022 realizing that in these trying times most people are feeling the need of revivification, our Bishops devised a plan and set up the website, eucharisticrevival.org, to inform and invite participation.

Our world is hurting. We all need healing, yet many of us are separated from the very source of our strength. Jesus Christ invites us to return to the source and summit of our faith in the celebration of the Eucharist. The National Eucharistic Revival is a movement to restore understanding and devotion to this great mystery here in the United States by helping us renew our worship of Jesus Christ in the Eucharist. eucharisticrevival.org

OUR JOURNEY

THE FEAST OF CORPUS CHRISTI - JUNE 19, 2022

Launched our national response to the Lord's call to revivify devotion to his Real Presence with widespread eucharistic processions and adoration on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ.

YEAR OF DIOCESAN REVIVAL - JUNE 19, 2022 – JUNE 11, 2023

This first year of the Revival invited diocesan staff, bishops, and priests to respond to the Lord's personal invitation and equipped them to share this love with the faithful.

YEAR OF PARISH REVIVAL - JUNE 11, 2023 – JULY 17, 2024

The second phase will foster Eucharistic devotion at the parish level, strengthening our liturgical life through faithful celebration of the Mass, Eucharistic Adoration, missions, resources, preaching, and organic movements of the Holy Spirit.

YEAR OF GOING OUT ON MISSION - JULY 21, 2024 – PENTECOST 2025

Having enkindled a missionary fire in the hearts of the American faithful, the Holy Spirit will send us out on mission to share the gift of our Eucharistic Lord as we enter the universal Church's jubilee year in 2025, Jubilee of the first Christological Council, the Council of Nicea in 325.

The I AM HERE campaign is the way our local Church is responding to the call from the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops in a "uniquely Detroit way." Blessed Carlos Acutis, patron saint of this Eucharistic Revival, declared

"Jesus is my great friend and the Eucharist is my highway to heaven." "Blessed Carlos saw St. John's resting near Jesus' heart at the Last Supper as a beautiful



image of where every Christian life should be – a heart to heart relationship with Jesus in the Eucharist rooted in friendship and divine intimacy.” Millennial in Paradise 96

Bishop Robert Barron, confirmed this call to intimacy

when he said, “the word ‘adoration’ comes from the Latin *ad oratio*, which literally means ‘mouth to mouth’.” Then he cited the Song of Songs:

“O that you would kiss me with the kisses of your mouth!” Thus, meeting someone mouth to mouth can be mean to kiss them in an act of love and unity. Or mouth to mouth can mean, the Bishop

continued, referring to God who breathed his spirit and life into Adam in the Garden of Eden, the giving of life-breath, as in CPR when one uses one’s own breath to revive the life of another. theyoungcatholicwoman.com; Word on Fire, *Eucharistic Reflections*

During these days of special grace, as we journey together, we know that over and over again Christ will call out from his exposed place in an adoration chapel or from a tabernacle, even as we drive by a Church, and invite his beloved children to stay with him, to sit in silence and be present with him —as he gently whispers “*I am here.*”

THE EUCCHARISTIC MIRACLE OF SANTARÉM – 13TH CENTURY

A woman living in Santarém, Portugal around 1225 was distressed that her husband was unfaithful to her, and she decided to consult a sorceress for help. The sorceress told her the price of her services was a consecrated host.

She went to Mass and received the Eucharist on her tongue, removed the Eucharist from her mouth, wrapped it in her veil, and headed to the door of the church. But before she got out, the host began to bleed.

When she got home, she put the bloodied host in a trunk. That night, a miraculous light emanated from the trunk. She repented of what she had done and the next morning both she and her husband confessed to their priest. The priest brought the Host back to the St. Stephan's Church in a solemn procession; placed it in a small ball of wax to stop the bleeding, and deposited it in the Tabernacle.



When the priest opened the Tabernacle door he found the wax ball had broken into small pieces. In its place was a beautiful crystal ampoule with the Blood of the Host inside. The ampoule is approximately 1/2" thick and 2" in diameter, crystalline clear and with a small protrusion on the side that contains the largest amount of the Blood. It is an irregularly shaped crystal, through which the real Flesh can be seen. One can observe delicate veins running from top to bottom of the Flesh and a quantity of the precious Blood, which is collected at one end. After 750 years, the Precious Blood remains in liquid form, defying the natural laws of science.

INTRODUCING OUR CORPUS CHRISTI NOVENA PREACHER

Father Andrew Hofer, OP



Fr. Andrew Hofer, O.P. is an Associate Professor of Patristics and Ancient Languages and Director of the Doctoral Program at the Dominican House of Studies in Washington, DC. He grew up as the youngest of ten children on a Kansas farm. Father entered the Dominican Province of St. Joseph in 1995 and professed simple vows the following year. He made his profession of solemn vows in the Great Jubilee Year of 2000, and was ordained a deacon in 2001 and a priest in 2002.

His assignments have included serving as a parochial vicar in Rhode Island, a missionary in Kenya, a doctoral student at the University of Notre Dame, a formator at the Dominican House of Studies, a member of the Pontifical Faculty of the Immaculate

Conception, and a formator at St. Dominic Priory in Washington. Since the fall of 2021, he has been the editor of the journal *The Thomist*, for which he previously was book review editor.
